



We return once more for this 5th Sunday of Ordinary time to readings concerning the call and formation of disciples. Having called His first followers, we saw Jesus last weekend performing His first sign in St Mark's gospel, the exorcism of an unclean spirit, a sure mark of the new kingdom. This week Jesus enters the house of Simon and Andrew...James and John are along...Simon's mother-law lay sick with fever. They told Him about her condition. He grasped her by the hand and helped her up (literally, "raised her up", same word that is used for his own resurrection). In their Jewish culture, as the oldest woman in the home, her first responsibility was to provide hospitality when a guest entered her home...she was in bed with a fever...she could not do it...but Jesus restored her health.

Her immediate reaction is a model of discipleship: "Then the fever left her and she waited on them." The Greek verb "diakoneo" later will become a standard term for Christian ministry, from which we derive the word "deacon". She waited on them. Truly, it is what Jesus Himself said He came to do: "not to be served but to serve". Last week's exorcism of an unclean spirit and this week's miracle of healing illness are both signs of the kingdom He came to proclaim.

And her "waiting on them" after His healing of her illness is the exact right response of a disciple. To spend oneself in service to Him and His followers (the Church or others) is the fundamental call of every disciple of Jesus.

The result of these two events is that the people begin bringing everyone to Him for healing. He leaves to pray...they find Him.. "Every one is looking for you." Yes, how true...how many hearts are broken, longing for, looking for more love, wanting to fill inner emptiness, tired of consuming more and more and unsatisfied. So many. We disciples are called to bring them to Jesus. He went out to all the nearby villages...we go out to our families and neighbors, our co-workers...to bring all to Him and Him to all. St Joseph, pray for us.

### IS IT EVER OK TO LEAVE MASS BEFOE IT ENDS?

This is an interesting question because beneath the surface there seems to be an assumption that if it's okay, then why do we have to stay after we receive communion? The short answer is "no," but we definitely want to go a bit deeper as we consider why.

First, when we think about questions like this, we must consider this in adult terms. If there is something gravely important that we need to do, then we must attend to that. However, if it is a matter of convenience or preference, then we really have to stop and think again. First, while we always want to recognize the importance of sacramental communion in the Mass, we also need to understand how important the time of thanksgiving and prayer after communion is. This is summarized in the Prayer After Communion offered by the celebrant and then we are also commissioned to "Go forth" during the Dismissal of the Mass, reminding us that we have been entrusted with a gift—the Word of God and the Presence of Christ in the sacrament—and that we are to share that gift with others.

If we simply leave after we receive communion, we risk two things. First, there is the possibility that we will turn our reception of communion into a purely personal, individual experience that is separated from our common experience of worship—and communion in the fullest sense—and, second, we lose an opportunity for gratitude and serious reflection if we simply leave after communion. This time of thanksgiving, reflection, and, ultimately, missioning, are important and, in the end, an essential part of the celebration of the Mass.
